Planting seeds of hope and justice for our neighbors, even though we may never enjoy the fruit. Planting seeds, providing fertile soil for roots to grow is hard and holy work. This rainy season in Zambia continues to bring abundant rainfall, and with it, a beautiful reminder of hope and provision. Our maize fields have been flourishing, so much so that our field workers had to begin harvesting earlier than usual this year. The continuous rains made it necessary to start sooner to protect the crops from being damaged. The harvested maize is currently being stored in a thatched shelter.

Our field workers have also been blessed with new uniforms and safety boots. They work long hours in the fields, often

facing harsh weather conditions, snakes, and the risks that come with handling sharp tools.

Thanks to your generous support, our field workers not only have this protective gear, but they can continue their vital work with greater safety, confidence, and dignity.

We are deeply grateful for your generosity and for standing alongside us in caring for those who work tirelessly in our fields.

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month



You may have noticed blue pinwheels around Frankfort this spring. They represent happy and healthy childhoods and are planted each April to commemorate Child Abuse Prevention Month (CAPM). The purpose of CAPM is to raise community awareness of strategies that strengthen families and prevent child maltreatment. The goal is not to focus on educating people about abuse and neglect, rather, it is to help them realize the impact they can have on families in their community and give them tools to prevent the harm before it occurs.

This year's CAPM theme is "Pinwheels of Possibility," and I believe it will resonate with you as a member of a congregation focused on experiencing and expressing God's unconditional love. Like God's love, childhood

should be full of comfort, grace, opportunity, safety, and security. As neighbors, friends, and Christians, it is our responsibility to support families and our community.

I encourage you to look into protective factors against child maltreatment and research on positive and adverse childhood experiences. We have a lot to be proud of regarding our efforts to help "the least of these" in our community. IBC excels at providing concrete support in times of need for families and opportunities for social connections but what else could we do? What could you do to help a family in need? Sometimes, something as simple as acknowledging that a new parent is doing a great job or sharing a community or church event with a neighbor can have an incredible impact.

There are a ton of ways you can help Frankfort children to experience the lifetime of possibility they deserve. You'll hear from me throughout the month, but I am available to talk about prevention, what the IRC is doing to meet tangible needs in the community, and what opportunities exist in Frankfort if you'd like to volunteer your time or money to prevent child abuse in April, or year-round.

Please join me in wearing blue on April 26th to celebrate Blue Sunday, an opportunity for faith-based communities across the country to promote our role in preventing child maltreatment.

Racing Louisville Pride Game

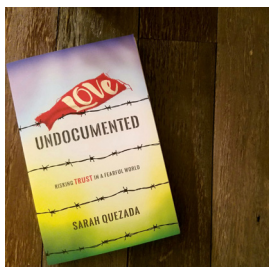

This is the third year of the Faith Communities coming together to support Racing Louisville's Pride Game, and Alan shared that they are hoping to have 500 people attend from faith communities in Louisville and the surrounding areas (last year, they had 300 people from roughly 15 congregations).

The game starts at 8 p.m., but there will be opportunities to fellowship with the other faith groups before the game. IBC members can meet there or carpool together. Soon, Alan will even be coordinating t-shirts for all the people attending.

The Koinōnía Class is adapting well to our classroom (Room 134). I was excited to design signs for our classroom.

I chose to incorporate imagery from the “Parents/Families of Addicted Loved Ones” (PAL) Group (<https://palgroup.org/>), so they would hopefully feel included in the space.

Since October, we’ve been delving into the topic of immigration. Our primary resource has been Sarah Quezada’s book, “*Love Undocumented: Risking Trust in a Fearful World.*” As per her website (<https://www.sarahquezada.com/>), “In *Love Undocumented*, Quezada takes readers on a journey deep into the world of the U.S. immigration system. Follow her as she walks alongside her new friend, meets with lawyers, stands at the U.S.-Mexico border, and visits

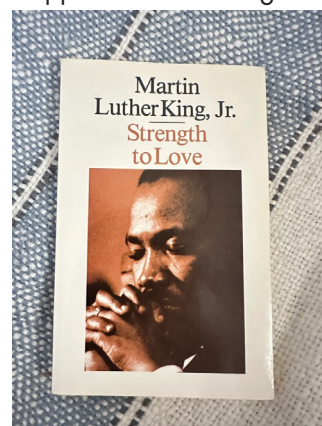
immigrants in detention centers. With wisdom from Scripture, research, and these experiences, Quezada explores God’s call to welcome the stranger and invites Christians to consider how to live faithfully in the world of closed doors and high fences.”

In addition to Quezada’s book, we’ve heard the story of our own class member, Grace Tamnjong, and her firsthand experiences with the U.S. immigration system. We also watched news segments, “Inside CECOT” from “60 Minutes,” and “Inside Dilley” from “PBS NewsHour,” to gain further insights into this important topic.

On March 29th, we gathered in the evening to share a small meal before attending a presentation by my colleague Carol Thompson. In 2021, Carol worked with children affected by the policy of child separation at Fort Bliss, El Paso, TX. Then, we had a “Q&A” session with Sarah Quezada about her book and developments since its publishing.

Regarding “functional Christianity,” Brent Irvin is using his skills and experience to pursue admission to immigration court. His ultimate goal is to become a volunteer lawyer with Neighbors Immigration Clinic (<https://www.kyneighborsclinic.org/>). As per their website, they are “A non-profit law office that provides high-quality, low-cost immigration representation and proactively organizes our immigrant community to support the flourishing of Kentucky.”

Our discussion of immigration will conclude on Easter Sunday, April 5. The following week, we will begin reading *Strength to Love* by Martin Luther King, Jr.

Special Guest Preacher: Susan Lockwood

Rev. Susan Lockwood will be our guest preacher on Sunday, April 12. Some of you may recognize her as the former Senior Adult Minister at Faith Baptist Church, who helped us organize our partner events with them!

Susan is an Appalachian Kentuckian - her ancestry rooted in early settlers to Boyd, Lawrence, Owen, and Carter counties. Her other ancestral links are to Georgetown, Lexington, and Frankfort. But her life experience has taken her beyond Kentucky.

She has been an ordained Baptist minister since August 23, 1983, and has served eight congregations as Senior Pastor or Interim Senior Pastor in Metro Chicago, Georgia, Ohio, Connecticut, and Kentucky. She has also served as Associate Pastor of FBC Morehead and as Minister to Single Adults at FBC Gainesville, FL, and Crescent Hill Baptist Church in Louisville. Her most recent position was Interim Administrative Pastor and Minister to Senior Adults at Faith Baptist Church, Georgetown, KY, which she left in January of this year.

Susan was one of the first handful of women pastors in the SBC in 1983, and is featured in the recently released documentary, *Midwives of a Movement*. She faced opposition on many fronts within the SBC, and eventually moved her credentials over to American Baptist Churches, USA, in 1994. In addition to pastoring ABC churches, she moved to New York City following the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center to serve as 9/11 Disaster Response Coordinator for the American Baptist

Churches of Metro NY and then as Director of Disaster Planning & Training for New York Disaster Interfaith Services.

Her theology and praxis are deeply grounded in God's radical and transforming love that she was taught in SBC Sunday School at an early age, and the vision of God's kingdom as inviting and inclusive.

She and her older brother, Chip, are graduates of Georgetown College - and of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. They grew up in a pastor's and home missionary household. Chip went into campus ministry, her younger brother John into pharmaceutical quality assurance, and Susan into pastoral ministry, following in her father Quentin Lockwood's footsteps.

She is married to Bruce Landis, a Library Technology Consultant, and they share three adult children, five grandkids, and currently an English Springer Spaniel rescue, Katee. They live in Jeffersonville, IN.
